IV. REPORTS / STUDY TOPICS

A. Membership Report

The Chair shared that any big news or information specific to special education is welcome and ideally we would hear from three to five charter schools each meeting. Donna Jacobson asked members for any solutions they might have around the shortage of service providers. Jim Anderson agreed that it is challenging finding staff and to track services not being delivered and sharing them with the IEP team or the family helps to understand where they are. Damali Thomas encouraged to have multiple NPA contracts. Amber Cox shared that the CDE NPS/NPA list has worked for them and calling agencies line for line. Damali shared the list can be filtered by address which is useful as there are over 500 hundred providers on the list. Damali will share the list with members. Nick Sessions mentioned that Edward B. Cole will be bringing Special Education Services in house and moving away from an NPA. James McGrath shared information about the international Intellectual Virtues Institute focused on a Student Center model that attempts to teach for deep understanding and how to structure inquiry based dialogue in the classroom and that more information would be sent out to the members. Jim Anderson shared information on LEA member Palm Lane Elementary withdrawal request and the waiver of a year and a days notice.

B. SELPA Reports

Alyssa Martinez, SELPA FOC, shared information about AB602 funding for this year and reviewed the funding exhibit. This is the first year that our SELPA has been funded on prior year ADA as it is the greater ADA than the current year. This is the first year we have had a decline in ADA. A document with five different options on how the funds can be distributed was reviewed and discussed by members. It was shared that the document with the five options will be sent to the members to consider and a survey to get a sense of where members are on this will also be sent.

Option one, base rate of \$715/ADA per current year with a little over \$700,000 retained by the SELPA Office. Option two, the \$700,000 is allocated to Members that were with us last year. Option three, the \$700,000 is allocated to those charters that are in decline. Option four was calculated at the LEA level, as is being proposed in the Governor's Budget, is allocating based on the percentage of greater of current or prior year ADA. It was pointed out that there would be some LEA's receiving less than the base rate of \$715. Option five, is the current year total entitlement of \$17,594,000 divided by current year ADA arriving at the higher rate per ADA, which is \$744.99 per LEA which would benefit all Charter members. The monthly funding is based on this allocation option. Jim Anderson shared that the five options were reviewed by Ad Hoc chair, Dr. Burns and with Governance Chair James McGrath. Ricardo Mireles asked if there was a recommendation coming from the SELPA staff and if we could review that option. Alyssa shared that Option 5 was the SELPA Office recommendation. Jim shared Option 5 would continue to be the methodology as it aligns with our current Allocation Plan. Jim also mentioned that every LEA can join Ad Hoc, and if there is a different option that might be better it could be discussed and then, based on the recommendation move it back to Governance Council. Shelby asked if there was consideration of weighted funding based on eligibility. Jim shared this is discussed at a State level in the West Ed Report. Alyssa mentioned that next year the funding will be calculated at the LEA level if the Governors budget proposal moves forward as is and this would then be the last year we would have to consider these options. James McGrath shared that this is being brought forward for discussion as there are so many factors and implications to consider. Ad Hoc went through each option and discussed. James summarized in that Option 5 keeps things in line with current and past practice. The State said prior year could be used and would help those LEA's in decline. Option allocates only to last years LEA SELPA members and Option 3 allocates to this in decline. Option 4 gives less than current year ADA to some members. We are seeing three main options, one is a windfall of funds, give it to the SELPA, the other is give it to the members equally, Option 5, or to the members based on the State intent to shore up funding for those in declining ADA which is some version of Options 2-4. Ricardo asked if the Chair wanted to present one of the options or if the Chair was going with the SELPA staff recommendation. James as the chair wanted to leave it to the members to mull over the three genuine options with huge pro's and con's as it is a very sensitive discussion and was not wanting to advocate for a position on the three broad options. James expressed appreciation for the detailed analysis brought forward by SELPA staff. The options were again summarized, distribute the extra funding: Option 1: to the SELPA to increase provision of services; Option 2, 3, & 4: to the members in alignment with State intent to choose between some variation of using current or prior year ADA; or Option 5: use the current *Allocation Plan* to pass the extra funding to all LEA members at a higher ADA \$744.99 vs. \$715. Dr. Burns highlighted that all LEA's are in a different place and that LEA feedback is important and using that feedback to help determine what will benefit all LEA's. Donna Jacobson shared that she trusted the recommendation of the SELPA and that this is a very confusing with not perfect solution. Ricardo Mireles shared that he agreed with Donna and would wait until a motion emerges and vote that way. Rachel Villalobos echoed trust in the SELPA and their recommendation and that this was very challenging to consider. Ricardo Mireles asked if there was a time constraint or urgency to consider or is there more time for consideration. James McGrath asked for a follow-up email so all voices could be heard and that any action on this to be taken at the next meeting.

State Mental Health funds for current year, is based on 19-20 P-2 ADA at the state's rate because ADA was not collected last year. Any funds that were generated by schools that left or closed were reallocated to schools that have joined us since 19-20. The total allocation 50% distribution went out at the end of February or first week of March and the other 50% will be distributed one fifth each month from February through June, you will receive it at the same time of the AB602 funds. It was shared that in the Governors Proposed Budget passing Mental Health funds directly to LEA's and not through SELPA's was proposed.

Federal Mental Health is on a reimbursement basis and it's based on 19-20 ADA at a rate of a little over \$11 per ADA, the total allocation led to \$159,000 and will need to submit Expense Report to Alyssa Martinez.

Jawwad Khatib shared there is \$893,908 have been received from the American Rescue Plan Local, it is federal supplemental fund and have two years to spend it.

Alyssa Martinez asked members to submit information needed for the Annual Budget Plan development.

Lizabeth Thompson talks about CALPADS Report 16.7 which is the document that reviews the compliance for the annual notification and determines which IEPs are out of compliance.

Damali Thomas shared that the Personnel Data Report is due to the CDE by June 30th and must reflect personnel as of October 6, 2021.

The SELPA Director recommends that the Governance Council find that, upon consideration of the COVID-19 state of emergency, that the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the Governance Council to meet safely in person, which would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, and that remote teleconference meetings should be held for the period of May 26, 2022 through June 25, 2022, or such time the Governance Board adopts a subsequent finding in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the Governance Council may continue to teleconference without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section 54953.

B. Approval of Ad Hoc Recommendation of Option 3 AB602 Allocation: for fiscal year 2021-22 allocate AB602 funding using the current year state minimum base rate of \$715 per 2021-22 ADA to all member LEAs. To minimize the fiscal impact of declining ADA, the excess base AB602 entitlement will be allocated to LEAs who were members of the SELPA in 2020-21 and had higher ADA in 2020-21 than in 2021-22.

Based on the 2021-22 AB602 funding allocation survey results and discussion in the Ad Hoc Committee meeting on April 28, 2022, the preferred allocation model is option 3. Please see descriptions below and the attached comparison of these allocation options.

Option 3: Current year ADA at base rate of \$715/ADA. Excess allocated to charters who were members of the SELPA in 2020-21 AND had higher ADA in 2020-21 than in 2021-22.

Option 5: Current year ADA at adjusted rate of \$744.99/ADA. Total entitlement distributed to all SELPA members equally.

The survey results showed a preference for allocating excess funding to charters who were members of the SELPA in 2020-21. Therefore, Ad Hoc is forwarding a motion to approve allocation Option 3 in the Governance Council meeting on May 26, 2022.

AB602 funds are currently being distributed monthly based on Option 5, current year ADA at adjusted rate of \$744.99/ADA. If the motion to implement allocation Option 3 passes May and June apportionments will be adjusted to reflect the new allocation model for the year. If the motion to implement allocation Option 3 does not pass, the SELPA will continue to allocate the total entitlement based on current year ADA, Option 5.

Projected special education budget funding, revenues, and expenditures by LEAs are specified in **Attachments II–V.** This includes supplemental aids and services provided to meet the needs of students with disabilities as defined by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) who are placed in regular education classrooms and environments, and those who have been identified with low incidence disabilities who also receive special education services.

IMPORTANT: Adjustments to any year's apportionment must be received by the California Department of Education (CDE) from the SELPA prior to the end of the first fiscal year (FY) following the FY to be adjusted. The CDE will consider and adjust only the information and computational factors originally established during an eligible FY, if the CDE's review determines that they are correct. California *Education Code* (*EC*) Section 56048


