Mental Health Funds

- Beginning 2023-24 <u>State</u> Mental Health Funds will be allocated by CDE directly to LEAs through Principal Apportionment process
 - Funds must be used to support mental health related services to students with or without an IEP
- Trailer Bill Language per the May Revision clarifies <u>Federal</u> Mental Health Funds will also be reimbursed directly to LEAs
 - LEAs will report expenditures directly to CDE
 - SELPA will provide update to LEAs on process in 2023-24 FY



Update on TB Language

2023-24 May Revision Trailer Bill language requires pass through of prior year + cola + ADA adjustment • Education Code Section 56836.148 (h): "For the 2023-24 fiscal year, each special education local plan area shall, at minimum, allocate special education base grant funding to all of its member local educational agencies equal to the total sum of base grant funding allocated to all of its member local educational agencies in fiscal year 2022-23 multiplied by the sum of one plus the inflation factor, as defined in paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) of Section 56836.142 for the 2023-24 fiscal year, multiplied by the sum of one plus the percent change in average daily attendance of its member local educational agencies from fiscal year 2022-23 to 2023-24."



OHC Funding


- Funds do NOT need to be spent on foster youth.
- Funds MUST be spent on special education purposes.
- OHC is a component of AB602 funding and calculated at the SELPA level.
- Not able to reproduce CDE Foster Youth Count.



Ad Hoc Recommendation

- OHC Funds Allocation Method
 - OHC funds to be allocated based on greater of current year, prior year, or second prior year ADA per LEA
 - Allocate to LEAs who were members of SELPA in funding year
 - No Admin Fee charged or reserve held on OHC funds





Are there other allocation options?

- Allocate based on Foster Youth Count?
 - Funds do NOT need to be spent on Foster Youth, MUST be spent on SpEd
 - Foster Youth count by LEA is not available
 - Foster Youth counts are not accurately reflected by CDE until Annual apportionment (certified Feb of the following FY)
 - How to handle Proportional Share?
 - Foster Youth count is used as a demographic indicator for needs within the SELPA (this is not Foster Youth specific funding, it is SpEd funding)



Why base OHC allocation on ADA?

- Stable and predictable funding
 - Funding based on ADA will reduce risk of material amount of funding to be returned in following year
 - Example: Decline of 3 Foster Youth in 1 LEA approximately \$4,500 to be returned, spread over all 25K ADA in SELPA, \$0.18/ADA
- Timely and accurate projections
 - SELPA is able to project for Budget and after P-1 and P-2 is certified because ADA data is available
- · Timely and accurate distribution of allocations
 - SÉLPA can distribute monthly along with AB602 base funding in same allocation method: CY, PY, 2PY ADA
- Fairness and equity
 - Funds must be spent on SpEd, not required to spend on Foster Youth
 - · Foster Youth count is used as demographic indicator
- Transparency
 - CDE publishes Funding Exhibits with ADA data at P-1, P-2 and Annual
 - Foster Youth reports are not available

California *Education Code* (*EC*) Section 56048

Pursuant to *EC* Section 56195.1(2)(b)(3), each Local Plan must include the designation of an administrative entity to perform functions such as the receipt and distribution of funds. Any participating local educational agency (LEA) may perform these services. The administrative entity for a multiple LEA SELPA or an LEA that joined with a county office of education (COE) to form a SELPA, is typically identified as a responsible local agency or administrative unit. Whereas, the administrative entity for single LEA SELPA is identified as a responsible individual. Information related to the administrative entity must be included in Local Plan Section A: Contacts and Certifications.


